Air Quality Conditions in the City of El Cerrito

Korematsu Middle School students at the East Bay Academy for Young Scientists investigated air quality to determine areas that had the highest concentrations of particulate matter. Students selected test sites that represented the varying land-uses and geography found in El Cerrito.

Airborne Particulates Lab

Vista High School students collected and measured the relative amount of particulate material in the air around their homes and at their school site. They then mapped the relationship between these measurements and manufacturing facilities and freeways to determine if there is a correlation between the facilities and the amount of particulate matter.

City of Berkeley Bicycle Master Plan Update

The Bike Plan surveyed residents based on the "Four Types of Cyclists." The results will be compared to the existing and proposed bikeway network to determine the Level of Traffic Stress. Plan recommendations will focus on closing gaps in the Low Stress network and provide next steps for adopting and implementing the Plan.




